Meadowvale Community Centre turns 30!

On Saturday, Sept. 15, the Meadowvale Community Centre (MCC) celebrated its 30th anniversary.

When this facility opened to the public in 1982 it quickly became a special place. Our community had been waiting so long for a place where we could gather and participate in activities. The community centre has played a large role in the lives of families in Ward 9. Our children learned to swim and dance here. They learned martial arts and other artistic and athletic skills. Parents met each other and made new friends as we waited for our children in the viewing room overlooking the pool.

The facility is also home to organizations that have been with us since the beginning, such as the Meadowvale Seniors' Social Club and Meadowvale

West Preschool. We are proud of this centre's history and the partnerships and friendships that have developed over the years.

Residents celebrated with free popcorn, barbequed hot dogs donated by the Metro store at Meadowvale Town Centre and free samples of Panago Pizza and Buffalo Wild Wings, while enjoying such activities as Nordic walking, basketball, yoga classes and many more.

Next year will start a new phase in the life of the MCC as we start designing the renovations of our centre. **I will be holding a meeting on Feb. 9, 2013 at the MCC in the Youth/Senior Room from 12 noon to 2 p.m. for the community to come out and talk about what we need to include in the new facility.**

Construction is planned to start in early spring 2014 with completion by 2016. This will be an exciting project that I hope will meet with the same enthusiasm as when we built the original building. I hope you will all get involved and participate in the redevelopment of this facility as we expand and prepare for the next 30 years.

Helping kids make better food choices

Mandatory changes to food and beverages sold in Ontario schools came into effect at the beginning of September 2011 by the provincial Ministry of Education. The changes help young people make better food choices when they're not at home.

What will be different in secondary schools?

- Fried foods such as french fries and chicken fingers have been replaced by non-fried and more nutritious options like baked sweet potato fries, grilled chicken strips.
- Most pop and sports drinks have been replaced with 100 per cent fruit juices, water and milk.
- Pizza with whole-grain crusts, lower-fat toppings and more vegetables may be available.
- Vending machines now offer whole-grain granola bars, lower-fat popcorn and baked chips.

What will be different in elementary schools?

- Beverage machines will serve smaller containers of 100 per cent fruit juices, water and milk.
- Items like granola bars or healthy-baked snacks will replace chips or candy.
- Pizza days and hot dog days will offer healthier, more nutritious options.

Peel Public Health is working in partnership with both school boards to support schools with the introduction of this policy.

Idling control by-law

Mississauga's Idling Control By-law came into effect in 2009 and prohibits motorists from idling their vehicles for longer than three minutes.

The intent of the by-law is to encourage the community to contribute to the overall reduction of vehicle emissions in the City of Mississauga. Staff have conducted educational blitzes to educate motorists on the by-law and to provide environmental information on the impact of vehicle idling on greenhouse gas emissions and air quality. We have specifically addressed school zones and the idling issues in those areas.

Please do your part and remember: if you are going to sit in your vehicle for longer than three minutes, please turn the engine off.

Conserving energy

Now that Time of Use (TOU) rates have been implemented in Mississauga, I thought it might be helpful to provide some information on this provincially mandated program.

Our hydro is provided by Enersource Mississauga Hydro, a utility that is 90% owned by the City of Mississauga and operated independent of the city. Enersource manages the TOU program as mandated by the Ontario Government.

Smart meters and TOU rates are put in place by the Ontario Government to encourage people to shift some of their electricity use to off-peak hours. This will help save energy and help the environment because if peak use gets too high, Ontario will need to build more generators to meet those peaks.

TOU pricing also reflects the way the electricity market works. TOU prices

increase and decrease at the same times that market prices increase and decrease. Market prices are higher at certain times of the day and week when demand is high, and they drop overnight and on weekends when demand is low.

With TOU rates, there are three different prices for electricity based on the time of day of usage with the highest rates during peak hours when demand is the highest.



Promoting a healthier community

Diabetes and obesity are a very real concern to us at the Region of Peel. The number of residents with diabetes is predicted to rise dramatically from a rate of one in 10 to one in six citizens by 2025. As the level of municipal government responsible for health, we want to encourage activities that promote a healthy lifestyle. This includes walking and cycling and we have to continue to make progress in these areas.

I have been very involved in the Region's Healthy Communities initiatives and emceed our first conference on this topic on Oct. 19, 2012. We heard from planners from New York City about how they introduced programs that promoted a healthier community. We have already started some programs and others are in the works.

We approved our first active transportation plan in February 2012. The plan aims to increase walking and cycling trips from five to seven per cent of all trips within five years. We hope those numbers eventually double in the long run with continued improvements to existing cycling and pedestrian networks and more new programs to shift travel behaviour.

Greater physical activity can help reduce diabetes and obesity. The goal is to make Peel more pedestrian and bicycle-friendly.

Providing child care for more children

The Region of Peel is responsible for managing subsidies for child care and currently has a waiting list of 3,449 children, with 820 ready to begin a child care program immediately. We have a growing list of children with special needs who need safe affordable child care. We also operate 12 child care centres providing spaces for up to 864 children.

In an effort to enable more parents in Peel to access high quality child care and special needs resources, our staff conducted a review that resulted in a proposal to close the Region's 12 child care centres, thus freeing up funding to help more families.

Instead of endorsing the first report, I recommended a task force be established to review all possible options. The Task Force has met over the past 7 months and, after thoroughly looking at all possible options, made a final recommendation that was endorsed by Council on Sept. 13, 2012.

As a result, the Region of Peel is undertaking a phased withdrawal from the direct operation of child care services at its 12 Learn.Play.Care. Centres by September 2014.

The current funding will be redirected to:

- Help more families access child care
- Improve child care quality and standards
- Provide early intervention and supports to children with special needs

Council also assured parents currently in these programs that no child will be left without child care and staff will work with parents and private providers to ensure this.

The Task Force will continue to meet and guide the implementation of the recommendations, which will occur over the next two years.

Clean Carpet Campaign

Renovating your home? Wondering what to do with that old carpet? Now you can recycle it as part of the first municipal carpet recycling program. The 'Clean Carpet Campaign' is an initiative to keep carpets out of landfills and, instead, repurpose the fibres for new products.

Through a partnership with CarpetCycle Canada, dry, debris-free, uncut carpet will be recycled for reuse in different markets. We currently send approximately 35 tonnes of carpet per week to CarpetCycle Canada.

You can contribute to the success of the program by ensuring the carpet is dry, free of garbage, carpet tacks and staples. Carpets do not have to be cut into strips.

You can drop off your carpet at our local Battleford Community Recycling Centre from Monday to Sunday between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. at 2255 Battleford Rd., Mississauga.

Understanding your home's sewer system

The first step in understanding your home's sewer system is knowing there is a network of pipes and systems that runs in and around your home.

The sanitary sewer takes water (called wastewater) from toilets, showers, laundry and sinks. The wastewater is collected in pipes that run throughout your home, which are connected through one large pipe that goes to the Region of Peel's sanitary sewer system. You are responsible for your wastewater pipes inside and underneath your home to your property line. Keep them free of debris such as hair, grease and other objects so they function properly. If they get clogged, it's your responsibility to get them cleared out.

The storm sewer on your street collects rain and melting snow as well as water from lawn watering and car washing and sends it directly into Mississauga's storm sewer system. Storm sewer pipes run beneath the road outside your home. The water then flows into storm water management ponds, creeks and rivers. You are responsible for storm water on your property. You can ensure storm water gets to the sewer by checking your property's grading and disconnecting your downspouts, which will allow the water to flow away from your home. Please do not pour any oils or chemicals down the storm sewer as this can affect our local lakes like Wabukayne and Aquitaine and the wildlife living in them.

Streetsville Pumping Station Renovation

Work is ongoing. New reservoir is built and work started on the new building.

NOTE: The curb lane and sidewalk on southbound Erin Mills Parkway north of Erin Centre Boulevard is closed 24-hours a day until March 2013 while a valve chamber is installed to connect the new pumping station facility to the existing distribution system. Please expect delays at this location.

In mid-February watch for a complete closure of southbound Erin Mills Parkway for the installation of two surge vessels at the facility. Work will likely be done over a weekend.
