COMMENTS:	The total estimated consulting services funding approved 2013 budgets is \$10.6 million of whi pertains to capital projects and \$1.1 million or programs. The Roads, Storm Drainage, and W	ich \$9.5 million or 90% 10% to operating

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accounts for 24% or \$2.6 million of the total consulting services with Land Development Services, Recreation, Parks & Forestry and Information Technology Service Areas accounting for \$1.3 million, \$1.3 million, \$1.2 million, and \$1.1 million respectively.

Appendix 1, attached, provides a summary and detailed listing of the estimated consulting services included in the approved 2013 budgets by service area. The lists include a wide variety of consulting services such as Studies, Design Services, Technology System/Software Services, Environmental Assessments, Structural Engineering Services, Electrical and Mechanical Engineering Services, Legal and Other Consulting Services.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Funding is approved in either the capital or operating budgets to provide for consulting services. For 2013, a total of \$10.6 million is included in the operating and capital budgets to fund a wide variety of consulting services.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

In 2013, the City will engage consultants to provide specialized expertise not available within the City's workforce, in cases where there is no capacity of City resources to provide the services or where third party expert advice and knowledge is needed.

Award of these consultant contracts will follow the City's Purchasing By-law and procedural requirements.

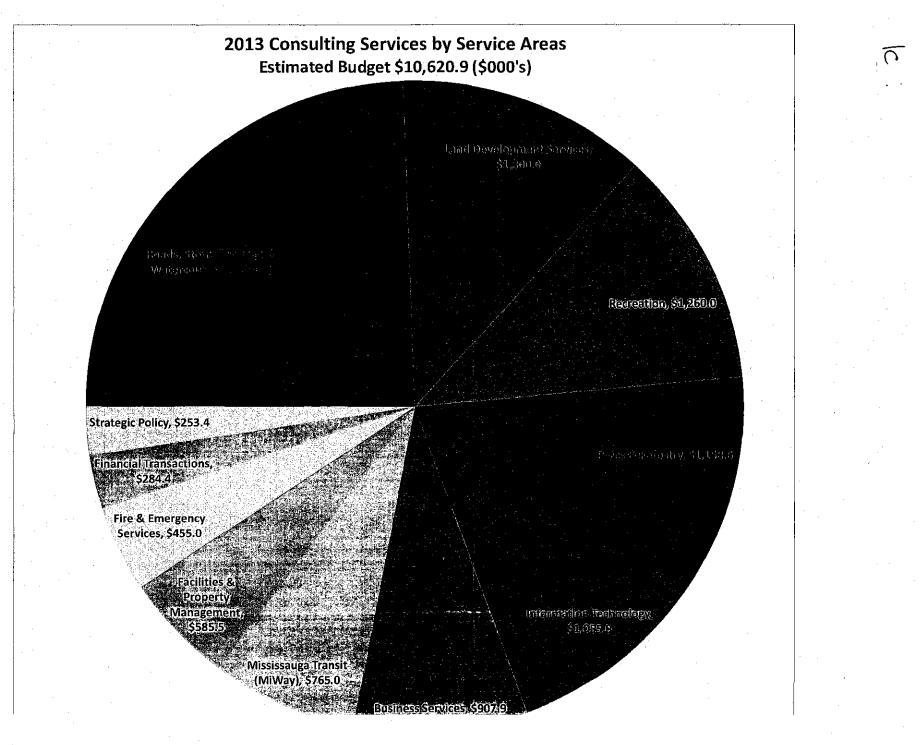

Most U-Pass programs do not include summer terms or part-time students, hence at the time of the original request, MiWay did not have experience with the part-time student university transit usage to accurately forecast cost and revenue.

To gain a better understanding of the student travel patterns during the summer months and to forecast anticipated costs and revenue, MiWay implemented a summer U-Pass pilot program in 2011 with only the full-time UTM students. Ridership studies indicated that 240,000 U-Pass boardings took place during the four month pilot.

To determine future student interest, UTMSU held a referendum in March 2012 for the part-time students. They responded with a 91% vote in favour of a four month summer U-Pass program and 93% in favour of an eight month fall/winter U-Pass program.

For 2012, the summer U-Pass pilot was expanded to include both the full-time and part-time students. This pilot allowed time for MiWay staff to monitor part-time student travel demand and the impacts on the transit services. During the summer months more students have part-time status versus full-time status and therefore the results showed that the number of summer U-Pass boardings grew to 410,000, an increase of 170,000 over the 2011 summer term.

Summer U-Pass prices were set to achieve a revenue per boarding figure consistent with the Council-approved revenue/cost ratio, requiring no additional subsidy to include part-time students. Staff also observed higher than expected pass replacement rates (due to lost passes) that may have created opportunities for misuse. The rules around replacement passes and associated fees have been adjusted to address this concern.

#### **COMMENTS:**

MiWay's experience with the U-Pass and summer U-Pass programs has indicated it is a win-win scenario. For the student it reduces transportation costs, creates new and convenient travel options and makes it cheaper and easier to use transit more often for school, errands, social outings, etc. Students may also be more likely to continue to use transit after they graduate. Benefits to transit include ridership growth and reduced fare administration costs. Community benefits include decreased automobile traffic, which improves the environment and health of the community. Ridership studies for the eight month U-Pass program indicate that full-time U-Pass student trips on MiWay have continued to increase, moving from 700,000 in 2007/08 to over 2 million during the 2012/2013 academic year (based on current forecasts).

This is an increase of 1.3 million boardings since the introduction of the U-Pass program.

Based on the positive results from the two pilot programs, staff from MiWay worked closely with UTMSU to expand the contract for the eight month term to include part-time students. A further summer U-Pass contract was created for the four month summer term to include both the full-time and part-time students for 2013 and 2014. MiWay does not anticipate any undue stress on current transit services. In general, it is not expected that additional resources will be required to handle increased usage resulting from adding part-time students to the U-Pass or summer U-Pass programs.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT:

The U-Pass and summer U-Pass prices are set at a substantial reduction since all students pay for the pass through student fees regardless of their usage.

For the upcoming 2013/2014 eight month school term, enrolment is projected to be 12,001 full-time and 868 part-time students for a total of 12,869 students that would participate in the mandatory U-Pass program. The pass price is set at \$154.45 per student and therefore the estimated revenue from the fall/winter program is \$1,987,617.

For the 2013 summer term, enrolment is projected to be 2,661 fulltime and 3,256 part-time students for a total of 5,917 students. The 2013 summer U-Pass price is set at \$92.40 per student, resulting in estimated revenues of \$546,730. The 2014 student enrolment is estimated at a growth rate of 2.5% for a total of 6,065 students. The 2014 summer U-Pass price is set at \$95.17 per student resulting in estimated revenues of approximately \$577,206.

**BACKGROUND:** 

#### Living Green Master Plan

On January 18, 2012, Council approved the Living Green Master Plan (LGMP). The LGMP is Mississauga's first environmental master plan. It identifies 49 actions for the City and its partners to implement over the next 10 years.

Action 42 of the LGMP directs the City to develop a Living Green public education campaign "...that encourages community action in environmental priority areas."

#### The Peel Climate Change Strategy

The Peel Climate Change Strategy (PCCS) was developed by the Region of Peel, in partnership with the City of Brampton, the Town of Caledon, the City of Mississauga, Credit Valley Conservation and Toronto and Region Conservation (the partners). Regional Council adopted the PCCS on June 23, 2011, which sets the framework for the Region of Peel and the partners to adapt to and mitigate climate change impacts. The overall implementation of the PCCS is a shared responsibility that will be carried out, as appropriate, by all partners.

Action 5.2 of the PCCS directs the Region of Peel to develop a Peelwide communications strategy to inform and engage members of the public.

#### Let Your Green Show Campaign Development

Both the LGMP and the PCCS recognize the need to adapt to and mitigate the effects of climate change at the local level. This includes engaging the community to take priority environmental action.

Recognizing the overlap in audience, key messages and potential synergies in working together, the City of Mississauga and the Region of Peel came together to develop an awareness campaign to launch the LGMP and PCCS to the community and engage residents at the neighbourhood level in actions contained in both plans. The campaign is titled "Let Your Green Show". At the June 5, 2012 Environmental Advisory Committee (EAC) meeting, a Corporate Report outlining the details of the Let Your Green Show campaign was received by EAC. At that meeting, EAC endorsed the campaign and agreed to help champion implementation of the awareness campaign by encouraging residents to help turn Mississauga green and their neighbourhood win the Greenest Ward Award.

A deputation outlining the details of the campaign strategy was received by Council on June 27, 2012.

EAC members assisted in launching Phase 1 of the campaign at the July 1, 2012 Canada Day event in Mississauga Celebration Square.

#### Campaign Phases

Designed to engage residents in existing programs, the campaign was developed with three themes using a phased approach to implementation to take advantage of seasonal programs, activities and the availability of support tools and resources. The three phases/themes and implementation dates are listed below:

1. Phase 1 - Grow local/Eat local (July 1, 2012 – October 31, 2012)

2. Phase 2 - Use less water (March 22, 2013 – August 31, 2013)

3. Phase 3 - Give your car a break (Fall 2013)

Each phase of the Let Your Green Show campaign has a different set of key achievable environmental actions for residents to undertake.

Phase 1 was launched only in Mississauga. Over 500 residents participated resulting in over 600 actions. Phase 2 and Phase 3 will be launched across the Region of Peel with support of the remaining PCCS partners.

#### The Greenest Ward Award

Residents of each municipality will be encouraged to register multiple actions throughout each phase of the campaign to benefit both the environment and help their neighbourhood win the Greenest Ward Award.

While individuals can only earn one greenback per campaign phase, additional actions registered per individual will contribute to turning a map of either Mississauga, Brampton or Caledon green and help to turn their respective ward the greenest (i.e., achieve the greatest participation rate). At the end of each phase, the greenest ward in Mississauga will be celebrated and recognized at Council.

Ward 1 was recognized as the greenest ward in the grow local/eat local challenge of Phase 1. The award was presented to Ward 1 Councillor Jim Tovey at the November 28, 2012 Council meeting. The Phase 2 kick-off event on March 22, 2013 will also celebrate Ward 1 residents winning the grow local/eat local challenge.

#### **COMMENTS:**

#### Phase 2 – Use Less Water

Region of Peel staff will present the details of Phase 2 to Regional Council on March 21, 2013. To coincide with World Water Day, a public event to launch Phase 2 will be held on March 22, 2013 at Port Credit Memorial Arena. This event will also celebrate the success of Phase 1.

Phase 2 of the campaign will work exactly the same as Phase 1, with a brand new set of key easy environmental actions for residents to undertake and a brand new list of incentives or "greenbacks" to reward residents for taking action.

In Phase 2 – Use less water, residents will pick from the following list of actions:

1. Install high efficiency showerheads

2. Grow a plant that requires little water

3. Install a water-efficient toilet

4. Use a rain barrel

5. Check your home for leaks

Resources will be provided on the website to educate residents on how to complete each of the above actions and why completing the actions is important.

Once an action is selected, residents pick from the list of greenbacks. The list of available greenbacks is a combination of both discount coupons redeemable at a variety of venues that support core actions (purchased by the campaign) and items sponsored (provided in-kind) by community program partners. The number of sponsored greenbacks available at any given time will be directly related to the number of in-kind donations secured throughout the campaign.

With the support from the partners, the list of greenbacks for Phase 2 has grown in number from Phase 1. Greenback sponsors for Phase 2 include all the partners, EcoSource, Grown in Peel, Glen Echo Nurseries and other community partners.

New for Phase 2 is that some greenbacks will be available to all Region of Peel residents, while others will only be available to residents of a specific municipality within the Region of Peel. For example, only users registering with a Mississauga postal code will be able to choose from greenbacks offered to residents of Mississauga. The partners will continue to add to the list of available greenbacks in each phase. This will serve to encourage residents to return to the site and participate in future phases of the campaign as well as expand community partnerships.

Greenbacks will be limited to one per individual for each phase of the campaign. However, residents will be encouraged to re-visit the website often to select additional actions for the chance to win in a monthly draw and to track their neighbourhood's progress in the greenest ward challenge.

#### STRATEGIC PLAN:

The City's Strategic Plan identifies Living Green as one of the Strategic Pillars for Change. The Let Your Green Show campaign supports the strategic goals set under Living Green to "Lead and Encourage Environmentally Responsible Approaches" and "Promote a Green Culture". **FINANCIAL IMPACT:** 

Overall campaign development and implementation costs for 2013 are being cost-shared between the Region of Peel and the City of Mississauga with the other campaign partners covering any additional costs associated with the expanded program. The City of Mississauga's contribution to implementation of Phase 2 and Phase 3 of the campaign in 2013 is budgeted at \$20,000 and will be funded from the approved 2013 Budget.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

With the support of all the PCCS partners, Phase 2 of the Let Your Green Show campaign will launch throughout the Region of Peel on March 22, 2013 with the theme of "Use less water" to coincide with World Water Day. Phase 2 will continue to motivate residents to adopt green behaviours key to the LGMP and the PCCS and will reward residents for taking action.

The combination of experience gained in Phase 1 and an increased number of community partners established for Phase 2, has enabled staff to build a stronger tactical plan, supported by a greater reach into the community and the offering of more incentives for residents to take action at no additional cost to the City of Mississauga.

#### COMMENTS:

At their meeting of December 12, 2012, Council approved a fiveyear repayment plan for the amount owing from the Port Credit BIA in view of the large year-end balance owing (GC-0843-2012). A similar situation occurred in 2002 when the Port Credit and Streetsville BIA were granted a four year period to repay the yearend balance owing. In all other years, the BIAs have managed repayments within their budget allocations or from prior year's surplus.

Mayor McCallion requested that staff investigate the possibility of each of the BIAs setting up a reserve account to reduce the burden of repaying negative year-end BIA levy adjustments.

BIAs are allowed to establish special purpose reserves. The *Municipal Act* requires Council to approve the BIA budgets in whole or in part and does not provide authority for Council to amend these budgets. However, Council can certainly influence a BIA budget given that each BIA Board includes the ward Councillor and that

Council must approve the budget before the BIA levy is incorporated on the tax bills. As an example, for many years the City has directed the BIAs to include funding for the cost of the external audit of their financial statements in their budgets, which they have done.

Council could request each BIA to include a reserve allocation in their budget each year. The City for example, could suggest the BIAs allocate 1% to 2% of their annual budget each year to a reserve to fund tax adjustments. This allocation would not be sufficient to completely address the impact of the most recent, highly unusual, Port Credit BIA year-end tax adjustment but may help manage the impact of smaller adjustments. The challenge becomes having BIAs trying to budget to build this reserve while at the same time also requiring that they pay any adjustment required in that year.

Staff have spoken with Port Credit, Streetsville and Clarkson BIAs. They have noted that they have established reserves from time to time to manage infrastructure projects or to provide for contingencies. They do not believe it is necessary to establish a reserve specifically for year-end BIA levy adjustments.

FINANCIAL IMPACT: There is no financial impact on the City.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

A reconciliation is performed at the end of each calendar year to determine if the City owes funds to the BIA or the BIA owes funds to the City. If supplementary taxes billed during the year exceed tax and assessment appeal tax adjustments then the City will owe the BIA money. The BIA owes the City money if the reverse occurs. In this situation, the BIA will include the repayment amount in their budget for the next tax year. None of the BIAs have indicated it is necessary to establish a reserve specifically for year-end BIA levy adjustments.
