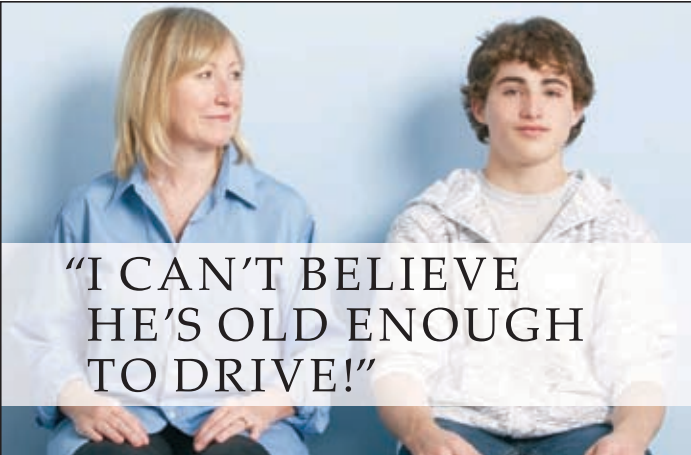

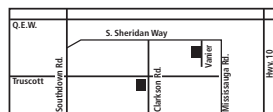

FLAG OF CANADA DAY

FEBRUARY 15

Canada's red and white Maple Leaf Flag was first raised on Parliament Hill on February 15, 1965. A year before, Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson asked that a new flag be designed to represent Canada at home and abroad. With thousands of submissions from all across the country, a committee of MPs made the final decision. With a few alterations to one of the final three entries, the red and white Maple Leaf Flag was selected as the new National Flag of Canada.

On February 15, 1996 Jean Chretien declared that February 15 be celebrated annually as National Flag of Canada Day! Let's celebrate one of our best known national and international symbols – Canada's Maple Leaf Flag!

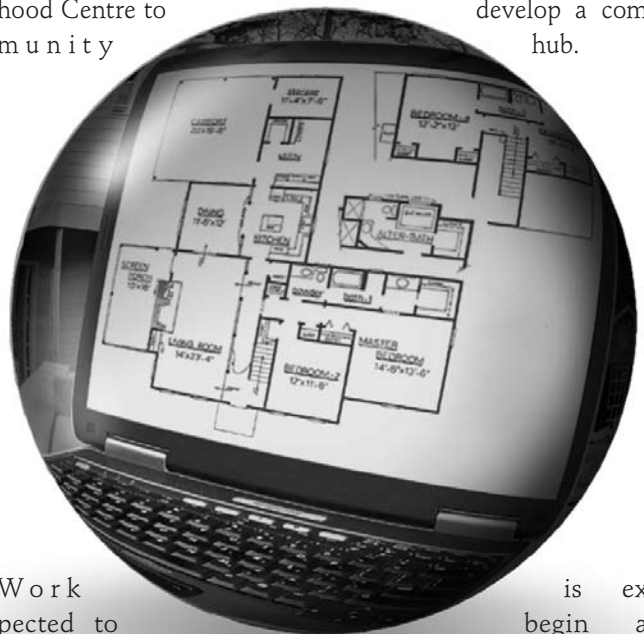


Infrastructure Funding Changes THE Face of Four City Libraries

Through the Infrastructure Stimulus Fund (ISF) Program the City is revitalizing its infrastructure, creating jobs and stimulating the local economy. The ISF program is a joint investment by the federal, provincial and municipal governments to fund infrastructure projects - each level of government is contributing towards the eligible costs. Mississauga has 132 approved ISF projects that must be completed by March 31, 2011 to be eligible for funding. Four branch libraries benefit from this ISF Program: Burnhamthorpe Branch, Lorne Park Branch, Lakeview Branch and Port Credit Branch.

The Library redevelopment projects build on the architectural character of the existing buildings and renovations will make them more aesthetically appealing destinations

for residents. Improvements and upgrades will provide enhanced public space including quiet and group study areas, enable self-service technology, improve accessibility, result in energy savings, and address lifecycle maintenance needs to extend the life of the buildings. Space at the Burnhamthorpe Branch Library will be created to permit a partnership between the Library and Dixie Bloor Neighbourhood Centre to develop a community hub.



Work is expected to begin at some Library locations as early as January 2010. Each location will be closed temporarily. Exact dates will be announced when confirmed. During the closure periods customers of these locations are encouraged to enjoy the services available at other Mississauga Library System locations. For maps, check out www.mississauga.ca/library.

Libraries Make up Ground to Attract Teens

In a world enamoured with the wonders of television, video games, and the Internet, libraries, with their multi-faceted approach to attracting new faces, are constantly expanding their niche in modern youth culture. Through “T.A.G.” – Teen Advisory Group – the public library has

found new and exciting ways to reach out and relate to the lives of the ever-evolving teenager.

The Mississauga Library System has a sizeable – and growing – online database collection, which makes things simpler for young adults, who are often tasked with complex research assignments. Because so much information is available at the click of a button, kids no longer have to leaf through stacks of books in order to locate desired information. The convenience of these databases, as well as a more relaxed atmosphere, allow youths wishing to do group projects, to get most of this done at the Library. This is great for school assignments, but it may also lead to them visiting the Library outside of school for recreational purposes.

In an effort to attract kids outside of providing school resources, the Library has purchased video game consoles, and has approved a plan to lend out video games to its members. This, combined with the potential digitalization of the Library’s music catalogue, brings the Library up to speed on the information superhighway.

Future projects the Library might consider are things such as video game tournaments, and book release parties for popular titles – events which necessitate community involvement, further extending the Library’s reach. With all the steps that have been taken thus far, the Library has successfully positioned itself in the minds, spirits, and hearts of this City’s modern youth culture.

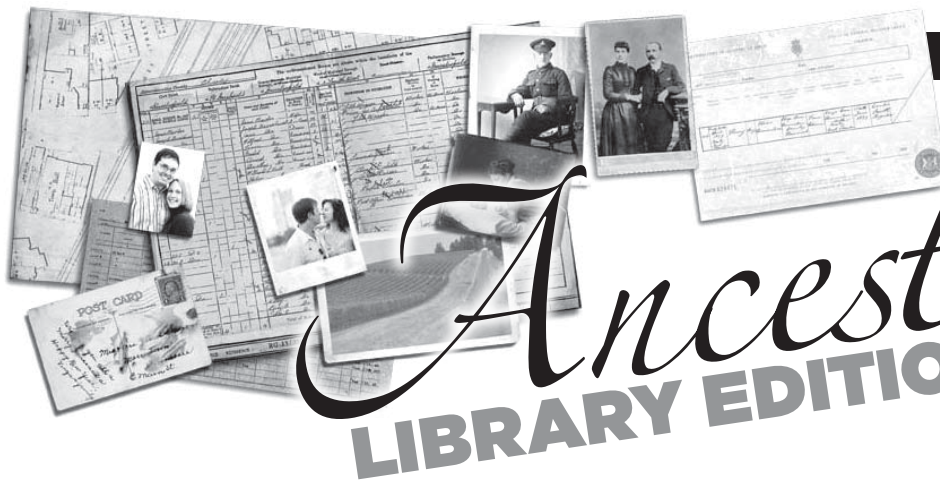

Ancestry

LIBRARY EDITION

How to Use It

The number one reason for using *Ancestry Library Edition* is to trace your family history. Although it's possible to find entire pedigrees on *Ancestry*, most people build their family tree record by record, starting with the individual they are most curious about, such as a grandparent or great-grandparent. Because of privacy restrictions, this individual was usually born more than a hundred years ago. But, it is surprising how much information you can find out about an American citizen through the 1930 census.

Ancestry Library Edition is a special version of the well known *Ancestry.com* subscription website. It is available on computers in Mississauga libraries to anyone with a valid library card. With more than three billion names and 23,000 genealogical and historical databases, *Ancestry* provides a wealth of information, especially for Canada, the United Kingdom and the United States.

After locating *Ancestry Library Edition* in the Library's list of subscription databases, you'll find two toolbars. The uppermost toolbar has three tabs: "Home", "Search", and "Chart Forms." At this point, experienced researchers may want to use the second tab on this toolbar to limit their search to a specific record or perhaps search *Ancestry's* mega "Database Card Catalog," but most will want to proceed to the simple search box immediately below.

Simple Search

If you are doing a simple search, type in your subject's name and any other details, such as a birth or death date or the place in which the event occurred. Although there are three tabs across the top of this search box: "Historical Records," "Stories and Publications," "Photos and Maps," *Ancestry* automatically searches under "Historical Records" unless you specify otherwise.

If you consult *Ancestry's* "Search Tips," you will be advised to enter as many details as possible, but sometimes this leaves more room for error. Less information may be better. Try entering just a couple of details and see what happens. If necessary, you can refine your search later. In most cases, you can expect a "Ranked Search List." It is rare to get no results at all. At this point, *Ancestry* offers you a second opportunity to refine your search by clicking on the desired record type on the left.

Typical *Ancestry* record types include:

- census and voter lists;
- birth, marriage and death records;
- military records;
- immigration and emigration records;
- directories and members lists; wills and probate records;
- reference works;
- surname queries from message boards.

Many of these records are fully digitized and can be printed. Because it is primary data, this kind of information is very important to researchers. If a record in your "Results List" is digitized, it will say: "View Image" or "View Original Image." If you click on one of these, you should be able to see the original document and decrease or enlarge it to your satisfaction by clicking on the drop down zoom in the upper left hand corner. Even if you don't view the image, you can still see some of the data. Popular examples of such records include:

- British Army WWI Medal Rolls Index Cards, 1914-1920
- Canadian Censuses 1851-1916
- Canadian Passenger Lists 1865-1935

- Ontario, Canada Births 1869-1909 (Marriage and death records are also available)
- Quebec Vital and Church Records (Druin Collection) 1621-1967
- UK Census 1841-1901
- US Census 1810-1930

Unless you check "Exact match only" in the initial search box, *Ancestry* automatically returns alternate spellings and abbreviations for a name. For example, a search for "Bill Smith" might return "William Smith", "Wm Smith", "Bill Smyth" or "B. Smith". An exact name match is the closest match, and therefore the most relevant, followed by common variants, misspellings, and nicknames.

Checking a Specific Record

To search just one record type in your "Results List," e.g. the *1891 Canada Census*, double click on the title. This leads to a second screen. Double click on the orange bar that says "Search This Title," and another search box opens up which allows you to search the 1891 Census. There are several advantages to a specific record search, especially if you are having trouble finding someone. For example, in the event that your ancestor's surname was improperly indexed, you can try entering just his first name, his age and his locality and see what happens.

Printing

Printing is variable. If you are printing the current page of a record, you will find a line on the left side of the page under "Page Tools," which says "View printer-friendly." Click on this and follow the usual printing procedures for your location. Generally speaking, what you see is what you get.

If you are printing an image, it's trickier, because you will probably be unable to download the recommended "Advanced viewer." In any case, don't use Ctrl>Alt>P to print. Click on the little printer located in the top right hand corner of the image box instead. You may also save images.
