NOTICE OF STUDY COMPLETION – MUNICIPAL CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT

Little Etobicoke Creek Flood Evaluation Study and Master Plan

WHAT?

The City of Mississauga has undertaken a flooding evaluation study of the Little Etobicoke Creek watershed. Phase 1 expanded upon previous studies of the overland spill from Little Etobicoke Creek during high flow conditions. Phase 2 identified overland urban flooding risk and identified, assessed, and recommended remediation measures for specific focus areas susceptible to flooding in the Little Etobicoke Creek subwatershed.

WHY?

The Study was completed as a Master Plan under the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (“EA”) process to identify areas at risk of riverine and urban flooding, as well as to develop a plan to mitigate risks to people, property, and infrastructure.

HOW?

In Phase 1, the Study completed a spill assessment for Little Etobicoke Creek in the Dixie-Dundas area. In Phase 2, the study identified existing areas that are at risk to riverine flooding and urban flooding during minor and major storm events (flood cluster areas). Six focus areas were chosen for further analysis.

Multiple remediation alternatives were developed and evaluated by the Project Team and refined through public consultation for the flood cluster and focus areas. The Project Team identified a set of Preferred Alternatives that are now publicly available in the Master Plan.

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Interested persons may provide written comments to the project team by **May 1, 2021**. All comments and concerns should be sent directly to the Project Managers at the City of Mississauga or Matrix.

In addition, a request may be made to the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks for an order requiring a higher level of study (i.e. requiring an individual/comprehensive EA approval before being able to proceed), or that conditions be imposed (e.g. require further studies), only on the grounds that the requested order may prevent, mitigate or remedy adverse impacts on constitutionally protected Aboriginal and treaty rights. Requests on other grounds will not be considered. Requests should include the requester contact information and full name.

Requests should specify what kind of order is being requested (request for conditions or a request for an individual/comprehensive environmental assessment), how an order may prevent, mitigate or remedy potential adverse impacts on Aboriginal and treaty rights, and any information in support of the statements in the request. This will ensure that the ministry is able to efficiently begin reviewing the request.
